Dear Subscriber,

Last week the Literature Board of the Australia Council slashed its annual grant to *Quadrant* magazine by 30 per cent. The board reduced our funding from \$50,000 to \$35,000. This is a big chunk out of our very modest operating budget and a major blow to our publishing operations.

The entire Australia Council grant goes to the writers of *Quadrant*'s literary content, that is, our book reviews, poetry, short fiction, and articles on literature, film and the arts. We have to account for every dollar of this expenditure. The Australia Council does *not* fund our opinion pieces, political commentary, administration, printing or Quadrant Online.

This Literature Board has made a patently political decision. Throughout the eleven years of the Howard government, its appointees never reduced the funding of overtly left-wing publications like *Meanjin*, *Overland* and *Australian Book Review*. In fact, those three journals always received more money than *Quadrant*, even though they carry a fraction of our literary content. *Meanjin* and *Overland* publish only four editions a year. We have three immediate options: (i) reduce the magazine's books, literature and arts content by 30 per cent, (ii) pay our writers 30 per cent less for their contributions, or (iii) appeal to our subscribers to make up the money we have lost. We are loath to take either of the first two options. Our literary content, edited by the great poet Les Murray, distinguishes the magazine and attracts many readers. The existing rates of pay for our writers are already pitifully low.

So, I am writing to ask you to help us in a small way. You can do one of two things:

- renew your regular annual subscription today. This would mean you are donating to the magazine the cost of however long your subscription has left to run this year, or
- take out today a Quadrant Premium subscription for \$300. We will also send Premium subscribers who renew before Christmas a free copy of my new book *The Fabrication of Aboriginal History, Volume Three, The Stolen Generations, 1881–2008* (656 pages, retail \$59.95).
