Gender-bender win

Landmark ruling on transsexual surgery

TWO female-to-male WA transsexuals won the right to be legally recognised as men in a landmark ruling in the nation's highest court today.

This morning, the High Court upheld an appeal brought by the pair, ending their three-year battle against the State Government to have their new gender officially documented.

The landmark decision means they will not have to undergo dangerous penis construction surgery or a hysterectomy to be recognised as men.

It will likely set a precedent surrounding the extent of physical change

needed to be legally recognised as having changed gender.

Both transsexual men have undergone a double mastectomy, testosterone treatment and counselling as part of their gender transformation. They are considered infertile, but neither has had their female reproductive systems removed or undergone a phalloplasty – surgery to create a penis, which formed the basis of the lengthy court battle.

Speaking to PerthNow after today's historic ruling, one of the men said he was thrilled with the decision.

He said the ruling meant he was now able to move forward with certain aspects in his life that had been on hold.

"It is really exciting to finally get a positive decision and exciting to think what positive impact this will make on other people's lives," he said.

"I have a few pieces of documentation outstanding that list me as female, so I will finally be able to sort them out.

"The other really key thing is that the way the WA Equal Opportunity Act is set out, you don't have any

protection against discrimination unless you have legally changed your sex so now, for us, we will be covered by the state's anti-discrimination laws."

Initially, the transsexual men applied to the WA Gender Reassignment Board for a certificate to recognise their new identity, but were refused on the basis they had not had a hysterectomy. They took their landmark case to the State Administrative Tribunal, which upheld their appeal, saying they did not need to remove their female reproductive organs to be considered men because they had undertaken other procedures and appeared – and lived – as men. But WA Attorney-General Christian

Porter stepped in, arguing it was part of a bid to clarify gender reassignment legislation.

The WA Court of Appeal upheld the State Government appeal and – for the first time – introduced the issue of not having male genitalia. The Court of Appeal ruled the two transsexual men could not have their gender re-assigned because they did not have the genital and reproductive characteristics of a male and had kept nearly all of the normal external genitalia and internal reproductive organs of a female.

But today the High Court unanimously upheld their appeal against the decisions of the WA Court of Appeal.

Swap takes biscuit for lost souls

MORE than 150 university students were prepared to swap their souls for cookies during a bizarre experiment by atheist activists.

University of WA students signed contracts, accepted "automatic" soul transfers, or blew into plastic bags that "captured" their souls, after being asked whether they would trade their inner essence for biscuits, muffins and brownies, during a stunt cooked up by UWA's Atheist and Skeptic Society.

Former Mormon missionary turned non-believer Daniel Midgley, an assistant professor in linguistics at UWA, said the event was designed to be fun while sparking discussion about the "existence of souls and the nature of consciousness".

"We don't think that souls are real, that there's a little person inside you that makes your decisions, or that there's a part of you that will survive your death," he said on behalf of the group.

"So, we wanted to see what people would say when they were presented with an opportunity to sell their soul for

a tasty treat. We got 40 or 50 contracts for souls, and we told a lot of people the soul transfer was automatic, so they didn't have to sign anything.

"For an extra bit of strangeness, I had some people breathe into a zip-lock (plastic) bag and write their name on it, and that was the method of soul capture."

More than 150 students took the deal, but 300 doughy treats were given away.

"We talked about what do people think a soul is, why in this century do they think it is a real thing and if you are superstitious about it, why are you

superstitious?" he said. But some were apprehensive about accepting a biscuit even if they did not believe in souls, while others wanted a cookie, but were stopped by their religion.

Mr Midgley said many people assumed atheists had no morals because they did not believe in God. "But being an atheist means you can assemble your own moral code," he said. "When I was a religious believer, I did good things, but I wondered why was I doing it?"

Give us Year 7 answer

FRUSTRATED WA parents are demanding answers over the State Government's long-running proposal to move Year 7s into public high schools.

The incoming president of the state's peak parent group, Kylie Catto, said delays over the decision and a lack of consultation was causing angst among parents.

Education Minister Liz Constable mooted the idea in 2009 and told parliament in October last year that a decision would be made "in the next two or three months".

But the proposal is still before Cabinet and parents say they are no closer to knowing the outcome of the review. "It's been around forever and a day and it's a very anxious time," Ms Catto said.

"All the surveys show 65 to 70 per cent are not in favour of it and I think that's because they don't know what it will entail and we haven't been told what the educational benefit is for our kids.

"There's been no consultation with us as a peak parent body."

Ms Catto, who took over as president of the WA Council of State School Organisations last week, said one of her first priorities would be requesting a meeting with the minister.

"We're very disappointed - we would like some real consultation," she said.

"It's a major decision and we

understand that they can't rush the decision, but to not be told anything at all is frustrating."

The Government has been under pressure by the State Opposition to end the uncertainty, but Premier Colin Barnett said he would be making no apologies for the delay because it was an important and complex change to WA's education system.

"I would hope over coming months, the Government, on the advice of the Minister for Education, will make a decision as to the policy, the timing and the costings," Mr Barnett told parliament.

"I am not putting any timing on it, it is a big decision. We are looking at it."

Ms Catto took over from outgoing president Rob Fry last week and heads up 600 parents and citizens groups around the state.

As well as addressing parent concerns over the Year 7 review, she said her focus would be making sure teachers were well-equipped and ensuring parents stayed focused on their children's education.

Ms Catto, a member of WACSSO for 11 years, said parents needed to take a greater responsibility for their children's behaviour and make sure they were being taught manners at home.

"It's my job to teach my kids to be good citizens and then they go to school to get a good education and hopefully be good, active citizens while they're there," she said.

Jacko: I didn't have a childhood

A HEAVILY drugged Michael Jackson said he loved children and felt their pain because "I didn't have a childhood", adding "I hurt", in a harrowing recording played in court on Wednesday.

In a phone conversation recorded just weeks before his death in June 2009, the pop icon also said he wanted planned comeback shows in London to be better than The Beatles or Elvis.

In the semi-incoherent exchange with his doctor Conrad Murray, who

is on trial charged with the manslaughter of Jackson, the star talked about establishing a Michael Jackson Children's Hospital with money from the comeback shows.

"Elvis didn't do it. Beatles didn't do it. We have to be phenomenal," he said, adding that fans should leave his shows saying "I've never seen nothing like this in my life... He's the greatest entertainer in the world."

Referring apparently to money made from those shows, he continued, in a heavy slur: "I'm taking

that money, a million children, children's hospital, the biggest in the world, Michael Jackson's Children's Hospital.

"Gonna have a movie theatre, game room. Children are depressed, in those hospitals, no game room, no movie theatre. They're sick because they're depressed."

After Dr Murray replied, "I know you would", Jackson continued: "I want to do that for them. That will be remembered more than my performances. My performances will be up there helping my children and always

FORGET Bear Grylls - these Perth students are experts at getting out of tricky situations.

The pupils, from Our Lady of Grace Primary School, in North Beach, have won the state final of the language and literature competition of the Tournament of Minds Challenge. And now they are taking their

problem-solving prowess to Hobart to represent WA at the national finals.

The school's Tournament of Minds facilitator, Monica Mulcahy, said the challenge required children who were willing "to throw up a couple of crazy ideas".

"They have to be co-operative team members and work as a team," Ms Mulcahy, also the teacher librarian, said. "They have to be creative and have out-of-the-box ideas. They have

to be prepared to take risks in putting themselves out there and come up with crazy things."

More than 60 WA schools took part in this year's Tournament of Minds, a problem-solving challenge for primary and secondary students.

There are four areas including, language and literature, applied technology, maths-engineering and social sciences. The students will travel to Hobart next week.

Man dies in fall

POLICE want to speak with anyone who saw a man fall to his death at a gorge near Tom Price yesterday while trying to save his son.

Christopher Mark Majewski, 31, of Leinster, was hiking with his son along Dales Gorge in Karinjini National Park, about 1500km north of Perth, when the boy tumbled down an embankment near Fortescue Falls.

Mr Majewski, principal of Leinster Primary School since 2009, fell as he tried to reach his son. Rescue crews rushed to the scene but he was dead by the time they arrived.

The boy suffered serious injuries and was flown to Perth where a Princess Margaret Hospital spokeswoman this morning said his condition was critical.

Women pitch for plum job of mayor

WITH just over a week until local government elections, the two high-profile contenders for the City of Perth are in campaign mode.

In PerthNow today, incumbent Lisa Scaffidi and eleven-hour contender Anne Bontempo detail their platforms.

Ms Scaffidi, who made history as Perth's first female Lord Mayor in 2007, said she hoped to improve public transport, overcome restrictions to upper-floor activation – and deliver free wi-fi access to “confirm our status as a vibrant, modern city”.

“The Central Institute campus in Northridge would be more student friendly if Museum St was made into a mall,” she said. “Access to all areas would also be greatly improved by extending the popular CAT service.”

Ms Bontempo, a King St businesswoman who has kept an eye on council affairs for years, said her focus was public transport, infrastructure and creating a new “heart” in the city.

She has mooted a plan for hybrid buses to service car-stacking facilities, which could transport commuters quickly and efficiently into the city.

Snacks in the city

Bargain bites tempt CBD customers

IT'S the battle of the bargain bites – and it's being waged across the CBD.

Whether it's steak, pizza or chicken parmigiana, a smorgasbord of daily lunch and dinner specials is just waiting to be discovered across the city.

At Carillon City, the food court – the oldest in the city – and the level-three eatery, are bending over backwards to offer the best deals in the town.

With more than 40 food outlets open from 7.30am to 6pm, they aim to keep their prices down for everything from

pizza to Gozleme, Indian to salads, and noodles to fast food.

Among them is Sassellas Bar and Bistro, where apprentice chef Dylan Smith cooks up a storm each day.

Each week, Carillon City also sends out a \$5 Fridays offer to its members, which entitles them to \$5 off any food or drink purchase from a selected restaurant when they spend more than \$7.50 every Friday.

The voucher lasts for one day and the first 200 vouchers only are considered valid.

Other inner-city food outlets significantly reduce their lunchtime meals each

afternoon so shoppers are urged to keep an eye out for any afternoon bargains between 2pm and 3pm each day.

Diners at Miss Maud's Swedish Hotel and Restaurant, on Murray St, can take advantage of a \$5 discount off the restaurant smorgasbord each night for an early dinner, between 5pm and 7pm.

Further discounts, including a morning special and afternoon coffee and cake deal, which changes daily, also apply.

A seniors' discount of 10 per cent is also on offer.

At The Court Hotel, on Beaufort St, customers are offered a \$15 steak with a

small beer or a glass of wine every Thursday night for \$15.

All pizzas are \$10 on Mondays and Tuesdays, from 5pm.

Carrieples Bar and Restaurant, on Murray St, boasts a different special each night, including chicken parmigiana and a pint of beer or glass of wine for \$19 on Thursdays.

The George at London House, on St Georges Tce, offers a \$25 daily lunch special, including pork cutlets, goats cheese soufflé or prawn fettuccini, with a glass of wine or beer.

Barista 235, also on St Georges Tce offers rolls, salads and soups from \$8.

NOTHING beats turning up at a cafe and having the barista know exactly how you like your coffee. Whether it's a skinny flat white with one or a long macchiato topped up, it's all part of the service.

To add to that service, a couple of WA cafes have added a string to their bow by using a new smartphone application and customers are lapping it up.

A conversation between 365cups co-founders Simone Eyles and Mariusz Strankiewicz who wondered, "What if you could order coffee via an iPhone App?" has resulted in more than 11,000 orders being received nationwide in eight months.

Of those, about 10 per cent are from the two WA cafes that have embraced the digital ordering system.

Breaks Cafe in Fremantle and

North Fremantle-based Swan Lounge Cafe have taken the new technology on board and regulars can now order coffee – and anything else the cafes want to offer – dine in, takeaway, or for pick-up later.

“The consumers love it, they don't have to ring up, they don't have to wait, they can save it as a favourite, so next time just one press and it's done,” Ms Eyles said.

She hopes to expand to about 15 cafes in the next 12 months, as far afield as Kalgoorlie.

Death of an iGOD

Genius who changed our world

APPLE'S late co-founder Steve Jobs has been hailed as a visionary who changed the world.

The former chief executive has died at the age of 56, losing a long battle with pancreatic cancer.

Apple released a statement this morning confirming Mr Jobs' death, and prompting a flood of moving tributes around the world.

Social networking sites lit up with messages, and Twitter was dominated by talk about the tech trailblazer.

Many said they learnt of Mr Jobs' death while using a device he invented, a point made by US President Barack Obama in his tribute.

Mr Jobs had an operation for pancreatic cancer in 2004 and a liver transplant in 2009, and remained with Apple as chairman of the board of directors.

He is survived by his widow, Laurene Powell, and four children.

His family said Mr Jobs died "peacefully" and they thanked those who had supported them during his fight with cancer over the past year.

"In his public life, Steve was known as a visionary. In his private life, he cherished his family," a family statement said.

"We are thankful to the many people who have shared their wishes and prayers during the last year of Steve's illness. A website will be provided for those who wish to offer tributes and memories."

In its statement earlier today, Apple said: "We are deeply saddened to announce that Steve Jobs passed away today.

"Steve's brilliance, passion and energy were the source of countless innovations that enrich and improve all of our lives. The world is immeasurably better because of Steve."

"His greatest love was for his wife, Laurene, and his family. Our hearts go out to them and to all who were touched by his extraordinary gifts."

Mr Jobs resigned as Apple chief executive officer in August, with Tim Cook named as his successor.

As news of his death broke, Apple.com turned its home page into a tribute to Mr Jobs, posting a large black-and-white photo of the visionary leader.

The photo showed Jobs in his trademark black turtleneck and small round glasses. The caption read "Steve Jobs, 1955-2011".

Apple fans are invited to send their condolences to remembering.steve@apple.com.

Mr Obama said: "The world has



lost a visionary", remembering Mr Jobs as one of the US's greatest innovators.

He said Mr Jobs was brave enough to think differently, bold enough to believe he could change the world, and talented enough to do it.

"There may be no greater tribute to Steve's success than the fact that much of the world learnt of his passing on a device he invented."

Mr Obama wrote on Twitter: "Microsoft boss Bill Gates said it had been "an insanely great

honour" to know him. "Steve and I first met nearly 30 years ago, and have been colleagues, competitors and friends over the course of more than half our lives," Mr Gates said. He was "truly saddened" to learn of his death.

"The world rarely sees someone who has had the profound impact Steve has had, the effects of which will be felt for many generations to come."

Fellow technology leaders, Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg and Google chief Larry

Page, also spoke of his passing. "Steve, thank you for being a mentor and a friend. Thanks for showing that what you build can change the world. I will miss you."

Mr Zuckerberg wrote:

Mr Jobs co-founded Apple in a garage in 1976 and helped design and develop one of the first ever successful personal computers, the Apple II.

The industry icon emerged briefly in March to unveil the iPad 2. His death comes just one day after Apple unveiled the new iPhone 4S.

10 PRODUCTS THAT DEFINED STEVE JOBS' CAREER

STEVE Jobs had no formal schooling in engineering, yet he's listed as the inventor or co-inventor on more than 200 US patents. These are some of the significant products that were created under his direction:

- 1 Apple I (1976)** - Apple's first product was a computer for hobbyists and engineers, made in small numbers. Steve Wozniak designed it, while Jobs orchestrated the funding and handled the marketing.
- 2 Apple II (1977)** - One of the first successful personal computers, the Apple II was designed as a mass-market product. It was still largely Wozniak's design. Several upgrades for the model followed, and the product line continued until 1993.
- 3 Lisa (1983)** - Jobs' visit to Xerox Corp's research centre in Palo Alto inspired him to start work on the first commercial computer with icons, windows and a cursor controlled by a mouse. It was the foundation for today's computer interfaces, but the Lisa was too expensive to be a commercial success.
- 4 Macintosh (1984)** - The Macintosh was cheaper and faster and had the backing of a big advertising campaign. It led to desktop publishing, accomplished with a Mac coupled to a laser printer.
- 5 NEXT computer (1989)** - After being forced out of Apple, Jobs started a company that built a powerful work station computer. The company was never able to sell big numbers, but the computer was influential. The world's first Web browser was created on one.
- 6 iMac (1998)** - When Jobs returned to Apple in 1996, the company was in trouble, with a shrinking share of the PC market. The radical iMac was the first step in reversing the slide. Easy to set up, it captured the imagination just as people across the world were having their eyes opened to the benefits of the internet and considering getting their first home computer.
- 7 iPod (2001)** - It wasn't the first digital music player with a hard drive, but it was the first successful one. Apple's expansion into portable electronics has had vast ramifications. The iPod's success prepared the way for the iTunes music store and the iPhone.
- 8 iTunes store (2003)** - Before the iTunes store, buying digital music was a hassle, making piracy the more popular option. The store simplified the process and brought together tracks from all the major labels. The store became the biggest music retailer in the US in 2008.
- 9 iPhone (2007)** - The iPhone did for the phone experience what the Macintosh did for personal computing, making the power of a smartphone easy to harness. Apple is now the world's most profitable maker of phones, and the influence of the iPhone is evident in all smartphones.
- 10 iPad (2010)** - Dozens of companies, including Apple, had created tablet computers before the iPad, but none caught on. The iPad finally cracked the code, creating a new category of computer practically by itself.
