Posts for the blogs of Lee Rhiannon and Justin Field: Issue of speaking to the media when there is policy difference between the Australian Greens and NSW Greens.

Kevin asked most candidates how they would deal with this situation when a journalist asked them a question that involved a policy difference between these two divisions of the Greens.

Lee Rhiannon and Justin Field have given very detailed and thoughtful answers to Kevin's question. Both have shown that this is a very complex issue and there are no simple answers.

Chris Maltby gave much attention to Justin's answer, posting four different times on Justin's blog. In sharp contrast to Justin and Lee, Chris appears to believe the issue isn't complex and there are narrow black and white answers. I agree with Justin and Lee, but not with Chris.

Let me illustrate some of this complexity by a concrete example.

Paul Barry wrote an item on The Power Index in which he talked about Lee Rhiannon being hypocritical when it came to Graeme Wood's \$1.68 million contribution to the Greens. http://www.thepowerindex.com.au/power-move/money-palmer/20120202979 This item was repeated on Crikey. http://www.crikey.com.au/2012/02/02/paul-barry-greens-meet-libs-on-donations-hypocrisy/

After considerable thought and consultation I submitted a response to Barry's charge of Lee's hypocrisy to Crikey. Crikey published it http://www.crikey.com.au/2012/02/07/greens-we-are-not-hypocrites-when-it-comes-to-donations/ and sent it onto The Power Index's editor who also published it. http://www.thepowerindex.com.au/opinion/greens-ask-if-million-dollar-donation-was-worth-the-trouble

You will see that I defended Lee and pointed out that she had no role in the acceptance of the Wood donation. I explained that we are a confederation of eight state and territory parties, and the NSW Greens has our own policy on donations.

This item on Crikey and The Power Index is critical of the acceptance by the Australian Greens of the Wood money. By implication many people will infer it is critical of our federal leader Bob Brown.

So I have two questions for Lee and Justin.

I'm not an elected member of any parliament or local government council, nor would I ever want to be. Yet, due to the extensive media coverage the Democracy4Sale project was received over the ten years that I was the project director, I'm seen by many people in the wider community as a very close colleague of Greens Senator Lee Rhiannon.

1) Therefore, was it inappropriate for me to submit this item for publication in two widely read online journals?


Jeremy Buckingham was asked by a Sydney Morning Herald reporter for his views on allowing affiliation fees to continue to be paid to political parties while banning contributions

from all corporations and other organisations. His answer was clearly a statement of the current policy of the NSW Greens. However, he was widely criticised in our party for making these statements.

2) Therefore, was Jeremy Buckingham acting more inappropriately than I was? If so, how?

In conclusion, Kevin's question leads to very complex decisions that our elected politicians must make within a political party that values transparency, grassroots democracy, individual rights and freedom of expression.

Hi Sandra,

During my ten years as director of the NSW Greens Democracy4Sale project I never published anything without running it by Lee Rhiannon and her office since the project was always co-ordinated by her office. I knew at all times that this was crucial since I was respresentling the NSW Greens.

The Crikey item to which you refer was the first article under my name that I myself did not write. I was asked by Lee's office if I would be willing to submit it in my name. It was written in Lee's office and I understand Lee did have a hand in editing it. However, you really should ask this question of Lee.

I was willing to submit the item since I believed Paul Barry was wrong to claim Lee was being hypocritical in one of her media releases about political donations since the Greens had accepted the \$1.68 million contribution from Graeme Wood. Obviously Lee had nothing to do with the acceptance of the money since it was entirely an Australian Greens matter.

It was only after Jeremy Buckingham received so much criticism that I realised I had made a terrible mistake in submitting the item that was published both in Crikey and The Power Index. By the time of the last SDC I had made an investigation of the process leading up to the Upper House vote on the electoral funding bill and I believed the criticism directed toward Jeremy was unwarranted.
