**State Report Card**



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## **About the Poll**

This report summarises the results of a weekly omnibus conducted by Essential Research with data provided by Your Source. The survey was conducted online over 4 weeks from the 21<sup>st</sup> November to 16<sup>th</sup> December.

Sample sizes were NSW 1,386, Queensland 719 and Victoria 1,170.

This report contains estimates of voting intention and ratings of State Governments on a range of major issues.

The methodology used to carry out this research is described in the appendix on page 8.

Note that due to rounding, not all tables necessarily total 100% and subtotals may also vary.

## Issues ratings

The following tables show responses to questions regarding whether the State overall is heading in the right/wrong direction and rating the performance of the State Government on a range of issues.

The net ratings of all states were negative on all issues - except for Victoria's performance on "police and public safety" which was +5 (29% good/24% poor). Net ratings were calculated by subtracting negative responses (poor/very poor) from the positive responses (good/very good).

35% think NSW is heading in the right direction and 40% think it is heading in the wrong direction - the best net performance of the three states. NSW received the highest ratings of the three states on "unemployment and jobs" (-18) and equal highest on industrial relations" (-12) and "water" (-6). NSW received equal lowest rating on "planning" (-15).

33% think Queensland is heading in the right direction and 45% think it is heading in the wrong direction - the worst net performance of the three states. Queensland received the highest ratings of the three states on "education" (-16) and "public transport" (-12). Queensland received the lowest ratings on "health" (-23), "police and public safety" (-4), "economic management" (-10), "managing the economy in the interests of ordinary working people" (-24), "industrial relations" (-21), "unemployment and jobs" (-32), "the environment" (-14) and "water" (-11) and equal lowest rating on "planning" (-15).

33% think Victoria is heading in the right direction and 40% think it is heading in the wrong direction. Victoria received the highest ratings of the three states on "health" (-14), "police and public safety" (+5), "economic management" (-1), "managing the economy in the interests of ordinary working people" (-17), "planning" (-13), "the environment" (-8) and equal highest on "industrial relations" (-12) and "water" (-6). Victoria received lowest ratings on "education" (-22) and public transport" (-36).

## **Appendix – Methodology**

The data gathered for this report is gathered from a weekly online omnibus conducted by Your Source. Your Source is an Australian social and market research company specializing in recruitment, field research, data gathering and data analysis. Your Source holds Interviewer Quality Control Australia (IQCA) accreditation, Association Market and Social Research Organisations (AMSRO) membership and World Association of Opinion and Marketing Research Professionals (ESOMAR) membership. Senior Your Source staff hold Australian Market and Social Research Society (AMSRS) membership and are bound by professional codes of behavior.

Essential Research has been utilizing the Your Source online panel to conduct research on a week by week basis since November 2007. Each Monday, the team at Essential Media Communications discusses issues that are topical. From there a series of questions are devised to put to the Australian public. Some questions are repeated each week (such as political preference and social perspective), while others are unique to each week and reflect prominent media and social issues that are present at the time.

Your Source has a self-managed consumer online panel of over 100,000 members. The majority of panel members have been recruited using off line methodologies, effectively ruling out concerns associated with online self-selection. Your Source has validation methods in place that prevent panelist over use and ensure member authenticity. Your Source randomly selects 18+ males and females (with the aim of targeting 50/50 males/females) from its Australia wide panel. An invitation is sent out to approximately 7000 – 8000 of their panel members. The response rate varies each week, but usually delivers 1000+ responses. The Your Source online omnibus is live from the Wednesday night of each week and closed on the following Sunday. Incentives are offered to participants in the form of points.

EMC uses the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) software to analyse the data. The data is weighted against Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) data.
